




An acute respiratory infection caused by Type A and B influenza viruses which circulate in all parts of the world.



- An airborne disease.
- Transmission through droplet from coughing, sneezing or talking to an infected person.
- Direct contact with a person with influenza.



PERSONAL PROTECTIVE MEASURE

PREVENTION

Regular hand washing



Cough and Sneeze etiquette



Early self-isolation if unwell



Avoid close contact with sick people

VACCINATION

Protects from 4 influenza strains:

- 2 strains of influenza type A
- 2 strains of influenza type B

Effectiveness:

- Develop antibody within 2 weeks after shot.
- Maximum immunity 1-2 months after shot and gradually declines.

Optimum time taken:

- From September onwards every year as the new virus variant emerge constantly.


Medication safety:

- Safe for people with asthma.
- Most people experience little to no reaction to the shot.
- Common side effects are swollen, redness and pain at the shot area.
